

Standard Vs. Honors Courses

- Honors courses expand upon the standard curriculum
- Honors have more rigor, higher expectations, and are faster paced
- Honors Receive a 0.5 GPA bump
- Students should be prepared to be
 - Self-motivated, motivated to learn
 - Thinking critically & writing analytically
 - Willing to study & practice basic study skills
 - Ready to ask questions, work in groups

What are AP Courses? When can my student take them?


AP Courses are college level classes taught in high school.
 Students can potentially earn college credit based on their an end-of-year exam score

 Most AP Courses are for Juniors and Seniors with some exceptions. If a 9th or 10th grader is eligible to take an AP class their counselor will discuss that with them when they meet.

English 9 Basics:

- Outside reading is expected at all levels
- Full-length essays will be written at all levels
- All VA English 9 standards addressed at all levels

General Level	Honors Level	
Read some full texts and some adapted versions	Read full texts of all texts, read classic texts	
More work (readings, homework) done in class	More analysis/evaluation done in class; readings and homework at home	
Typical outside commitment 1-1.5 hours per week	Typical outside commitment double that of general level	
More scaffolded content	More self-directed, independent	
Moderate pacing	Faster-paced	

English 9 Honors:

A great fit if...

- You love to read
- You are willing to be proactive with questions or concerns
- You are self-directed and independent
- You are willing to engage with the content

Social Studies: Honors or Standard?

- Honors may be a good fit if...
 - The student is interested in world history
 - The student is highly motivated to learn and succeed
 - The student has strong reading comprehension and writing skills
 - The student can manage their time effectively

World Civilizations 1: English 9 Honors & World History Honors

- One English teacher and one social studies teacher, two core subjects, one gradebook
- Teachers plan together so that students aren't overloaded on any given day
- Same skills are taught in stand-alone honors classes
- Same pacing as stand-alone honors
- Course is not harder than stand-alone honors courses, it is simply taught in a different environment
- Meets in the same room everyday at the same time
- Meeting everyday helps with the transition from middle school and builds more classroom rapport.



Honors Math is Different

- More content is taught in Honors
- Material is taught at a faster pace
- A majority of the class is non-calculator
- Significantly more application of skills and knowledge

Computer Science

- Goal: All Woodson students should have exposure to computer science concepts before they graduate.
- Prerequisites: those who have completed Algebra 1 can sign up for CS Programming.
- Students who have yet to complete Algebra 1 can sign up for CS Foundations.
- Enrolling in computer science early opens up opportunities for higher level courses later.



The Computer Science Sequence

9th grade: CS Programming or

CS Foundations

10th grade: AP Computer Science A (+1 GPA boost)

11th grade: CS Data Structures (+1 GPA boost)

12th grade: CS Capstone (+1 GPA boost)

World Languages



- American Sign Language
- French

World Languages: Advanced Diploma Requirements

- Three years of one language
- Two years of one language; two years of another
- Counselors and teachers will keep the requirements in mind as students are placed or moved

Spanish Immersion

- Students who have completed the FCPS immersion program through grade 8 are automatically placed at level 3
- Students with other immersion experiences (e.g, living abroad) may take the placement exam

Native/Heritage Speakers

 Students who already speak the language they wish to study at home--or have extensive experience living in a country where the language is spoken--may take Woodson's placement test. We are making arrangements with Frost for testing after students have made their course selections

World Language Credit Exam

- Given in the fall (November)
- Registration through counselors in October (firm deadline)
- Students must be able to write two well-developed essays
- Students may receive 1, 2, or 3 credits (depending on performance)
- Credits count toward Advanced Diploma

Students who pass the credit exam

- → One credit? Go to Spanish, French, German 2
- → Two credits? Go to Spanish, French, German 3
- → Three credits? Go to Spanish, French, German 4
 Or students may take level 1 of a different language

Online Campus (OC) classes:

- Students in grades 9-12 may enroll in up to 2 FCPS OC classes per year (count as part of the 7 credits)
- Often used to access an elective (i.e. Chinese, Accounting) or solve a conflict
- self-motivation, discipline are important as classes are hybrid of asynchronous & synchronous learning

Special Education



- Services are determined by IEP team placement

Parent Support

What can I do as a parent?

- Talk to your student about:
 - importance of balance when selecting their schedule (academic, social, personal needs)
 - keep in mind demands of outside activities and responsibilities (sports, service, siblings)
- Check Parentvue to review course requests & grade.
- Check Schoology to access your student's progress throughout the year





Course Selection Conversation

What should our course selection conversation include?

- Listen and be involved in the course planning process
- Ask your student about their interest areas
- Ask about their post-secondary goals and which courses best support those plans
- Discuss your student's study skills (i.e. do they procrastinate?) and personal needs (i.e. sleep/rest)





Can We Change Minds

What if we change our minds about a course?

- March 14 is the deadline to change your mind about course requests for next year
- Based on total course request this spring, admin will evaluate how many sections of each class is needed and will conséquently plan for staffing and hiring to support these classes for next year
- Because the master schedule is built based on spring requests, changes in the fall are selective based on immediate need. Details to come about that process






Woodson Student Services




